Syntactic or Structural Ambiguity

a situation in which a single phrase or sentence has two (or more) different underlying structures and interpretations

 The professor said on Monday he would give an exam.

- On Monday, the professor said he would give us an exam.
- The professor said that on Monday he would give us an exam.

The chicken is ready to eat.



The chicken is cooked and can be eaten.



The chicken is waiting so that it will start eating.

The burglar threatened the student with the knife.

Using a knife, the burglar threatened the student.

 The burglar threatened a student who was holding the knife.


- Somali Tied to Militants Held on U.S. Ship for Months.

 having a linking verb followed by an adjective (to become happy)

 having a transitive verb followed by a noun direct object (the garbage bags from the Glad company).
